Oregon General Election 2002
Likely Voter Poll

Cross Tabulations
October 30, 2002

METHODOLOGY

Riley Research Associates conducted a scientific statewide telephone poll among 604 likely voters. A likely voter is defined as a currently registered Oregon voter who has voted in at least two of the last four general and primary elections.¹

The poll was conducted between October 23rd and 28th 2002. A sample of 604 has a margin of sampling error of +/-4% at a 95% level of confidence. For the Democrat and Republican subsamples, the margin of error is roughly +/-6%. The results were weighted (slightly) by Congressional District, to more accurately reflect actual registration among likely voters (District 1 – 19%, 2 – 22%, 3 – 19%, 4 – 21%, 5 – 20%).

In this poll we made an extra effort to determine the likely preferences of undecided voters by probing a third time, with the question: “Toward which candidate are you leaning?”

¹ Three Oregon Counties had not yet updated their records, resulting in 14 interviews among voters who had voted in less than two of the past four elections.

HIGHLIGHTS

The Race for Governor

(The numbers reflect the proportion of voters “for” and “most likely for” each candidate.)

Republican Kevin Mannix has pulled to within four points of Democrat Ted Kulongoski, resulting in numbers that are now within the poll’s margin of error (46% for Kulongoski vs. 42% for Mannix). Cox continues to hold 3%, while just 7% of voters remain undecided (2% said “no one” or “others”).

Notes:

- While Kulongoski has consistently polled better among women (now 48% to 38%), men have see-sawed between the two, and are now statistically split (Mannix 46% and Kulongoski 43%).
- Kulongoski now has 73% of Democrats, while Mannix has 75% of Republicans.
- Kulongoski has won over more independent voters with 48%, while Mannix has just 32%, and Cox has 5%.
- If voting history is any indication, those who have voted in four out of the past four elections favor Kulongoski over Mannix (51% to 40%).

US Senate Race

Incumbent Senator Smith has increased his lead over challenger Bill Bradbury (now 56%, up from 52% a week ago). Bradbury has held steady at 34%. Only 5% are “undecided,” and 2% continue to support Libertarian Dan Fitzgerald, with 1% for Constitution Party candidate Lon Mabon (and 1% “other”).

- Currently, 32% of the Democrats support Smith (up from 27% in our last poll).

Ballot Measure 27 - Genetically Engineered Food Labeling

Opponents of the Genetic Food Labeling proposal continue to roll over supporters (72% to 21%), with just 7% undecided.

January Tax Increase Ballot

The legislature’s referral of a January 2003 income tax increase measure continues to be opposed by Oregonians (61% to 27%, with 12% undecided).

January Tax Increase Ballot – Tied to Education – Would Pass

As a follow-up, we asked opponents: “If you knew that a significant portion of the tax increase would be dedicated to protecting the current education budget...” The responses shifted dramatically. With the additional information, large numbers of opponents would switch their votes, such that, if the vote were held today, the measure would actually pass 50% “yes” vs. 44% “no” (and 6% undecided).

Ballot Measure 23: Health Care Finance Plan is Opposed

Currently, a majority of Oregon voters would oppose this plan (63% to 21%, with 17% undecided).

- One-third of Democrats support the plan, compared to 26% among independents, and just 8% among Republicans.
- One in four women support the plan (24%), compared to about one in six men (18%).
- Despite the potential for long-term coverage, those 75 or older were least likely to support the plan (18%, compared to 28% of those 18-34).

Ballot Measure 25: The Minimum Wage Increase Appears to be Passing

Currently, 54% of Oregon likely voters say they will vote to approve the minimum wage increase. Four of ten voters (42%) oppose the measure, and just 3% are undecided.

- Democrats overwhelmingly support the measure (72%, compared to 63% among independents, and 34% among Republicans).
- Geographically, support is highest in the 3rd Congressional District (67%), followed by the 1st District (61%).

Race for Metro Council President: Too Close and Too Undecided (+/-6.3%)²

The news here is that 54% of the votes in the District remain undecided. While statistically too close to call (within the margin of error), voters appear to give David Bragdon a slight edge (21%) versus 18% for Kate Schiele (3% said “no one,” and 3% “refused”).

- In this non-partisan election, 25% of Democrats would vote for Bragdon, while 17% would vote for Schiele; 17% of Republicans would vote for Schiele, but 14% would vote for Bragdon.

² The Metro area represents just 41% of the sample. As such, the sample size is smaller and the margin of error is larger (+/-6.3%).
